Plant of the Month



Grancy Graybeard tree (Chionathus virginicus)

The lovely silvery-white scented blossoms of grancy-graybeard (aka fringe tree) shimmer and wave in the mid to late spring breezes, making it a wonderful addition to the landscape. Both male and female trees have blossoms, but only the female bears the black olive-like fruit which is eaten by song birds and mammals. The male flowers are usually larger and showier. Flower buds form on last year's twigs.

In the wild, it is an understory large shrub or small tree occurring in mixed pine and hardwood forests. It grows well in moist, well-drained soil, but tolerates dry conditions as well. It is a slow growing tree, but will bloom when it is only a few feet tall. Companion plants include red maple, flowering dogwood, blackgum, native azaleas (Rhododendron spp.), blueberries, possumhaw and sassafras

Propagate from seed or seedlings found around the female trees. Also try layering, grafting, budding, and softwood cuttings.


