

Return of the Ruby-throated Hummingbirds and Nectar Loving Songbirds

Male Ruby-throated hummingbirds were observed in Covington and in other parts of south Louisiana in late February. So it's time to put up your feeders and to check your garden for hummingbird plants. Good natives include: Red Buckeye (Aesculus pavia), Coral Bean (Erythrina herbacea), Salvia coccinea, Small Red Flower annual Morning Glory (Ipomoea coccinea), Indian Pink (Spigelia marilandica), Coral Honeysuckle (sempervirens), Native Honeysuckle Azaleas (Rhododendron canescens) and Crossvine (Bignonia capreolata). Turks Cap or Sultan's Turban (Malvaviscus arboreus var. drummondii) is another good shrub or herbaceous perennial which is native to tropical America and has naturalized here.

Nectar loving song birds like protonotary warblers, orchard orioles, and other orioles will also appreciate the natives above, in addition to Louisiana Irises, especially Iris fulva.

April Mystery Plant

This genus contains many flowering and fruiting shrubs and small trees. The bluish-black berries are prized by both human and wildlife. The white or pale pink bell shaped flowers appear in late winter to mid spring. The plants are semi-evergreen and have lovely red and bronze leaves in fall.

If you know the name of this native plant, then be sure to put your guess and your name in the Mystery Plant drawing at the next meeting.


Chestnut Oak Seedlings

On March 7, a few FNPS went over to fellow member, John Cleary's, house in Hammond to dig up a multitude of Chestnut Oak seedlings (Quercus prinus) (I believe) (http://plants.usda.gov/java/profile?symbol=qupr2). Chestnut Oaks are large, stately trees with interesting, chestnut-like leaves and attractive bark. Its most unique feature is the extra large acorns that are the size of a small chicken egg. We gave away several at the plant show, but we still have some in pots for the April meeting.

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The Folsom Native Plant Society first met in 1989. Ninety percent of the group lived in Folsom and met either at John Larkin's house near Folsom or at the Folsom Elementary School.

Over time, the membership has expanded its geographical range, and now we are distributed as follows:
