#### **Bogue Chitto State Park - UPDATE**

FNPS contacted the Louisiana Office of State Parks about the opening of this new park. We were told that they were delays with constructing the road into the park. It seemed that once this was finished the park would be ready, late May 2010!!?!!

Among the many features of the <u>Bogue Chitto State Park</u> are the park entrance station, bottomland and upland (lakeside) RV campsites, tent pads and a comfort station. There will be large and small camp assembly buildings, and vacation cabins and lodges built on bluffs.

Some of many elements of the day-use area include the water playground's slide, a boardwalk/boat launch on the Bogue Chitto River, many places to set out in a canoe or kayak., and a fishing pier.

One of the river overlooks, part of the boardwalk system that will wind through the park. The hillside boardwalks will lead visitors through the rolling terrain of the area.









Part of the boardwalk trail system will lead down the side of a bluff from the Visitor Center area. Location of the Interpretive Center is overlooking one of the dozen lakes within the park boundaries. An outdoor amphitheatre can also double as an outdoor classroom for students' field trips. Part of the nature trail boardwalk will go through Fricke's Gorge. There will also be over 7 miles of equestrian trails.

The **Bogue Chitto State Park** is <u>located</u> on Fisher Road, off LA Hwy. 25 in Washington Parish, approx. 10 miles south of Franklinton.

\*The Coreopsis nudata (Pink Coreopsis or Georgia Tickseed) is the only pink coreopsis to be found in our Gulf Coast Region and is becoming a rare sight. In Louisiana, it is only found in St. Tammany Parish. It favors wet pinelands, wet ditches, flatwoods, bogs and pond margins. A stand of Coreopsis nudata been spotted near Abita Springs, and a volunteer from our group has offered to try to collect some seeds later in the year.
